Dear Holy Trinity Family,

Bill Smith, longtime professor of pastoral care at Luther Seminary who is now deceased, used to talk about four types or levels of communication. Each level is deeper. The goal is to move down through the levels to get to deeper communication and deeper community. The first level is *small talk*: "The weather sure is beautiful today." The second is *control talk*, the realm of commands, seeking to manipulate or move someone to where you want them to be. The third kind of communication is *searching talk*: "I wonder why the Church Facebook Clergy Page is so often a place of harsh communication?" The *fourth level*, which can only be reached with care and time, is <u>straight talk</u> where people are emotionally open and authentically speak from the deepest parts of their hearts and minds.

For a healthy church to reach the *fourth level* it will take both the laity and the clergy being open and honest with each other. That is a journey that is well worth all the effort!

Your Call Committee has been working hard. They want a pastor to lead you. One of the characteristics of the pastor they are seeking is one with a heart for the individuals of the congregation.

Rev. Carl J. Scherzer wrote a book in 1966 entitled *And You Visited Me*. Cody Carpenter introduced me to this book, and I ordered one for myself. It was written as "Guide for Lay Visitors to the Sick." The personal needs of Holy Trinity are so important, and so varied, that no single person can begin to meet all the needs. I have a prayer and a vision that is based on Ephesians 4:11-12. Paul gives wise counsel when he writes: ¹¹ The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, ¹² to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ....

The phrase: to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ.... is a primary way to think as you are seeking to call a new Lead Pastor. But always remember that it takes both the clergy and the laity working together to have a healthy and dynamic ministry.

Thomas Gillespie wrote:

Pastoring will be realized only if the non-clergy are willing to MOVE UP, if the clergy are willing to MOVE OVER, and if all of God's people are willing to MOVE OUT!

That, my dear people, is my prayer for Holy Trinity and your next Lead Pastor! To God be the Glory!

EASTER SUNDAY - AN EMPTY CROSS A Risen and Scarred Savior!

Presumably [Jesus] could have had any resurrected body he wanted, and yet he chose one identifiable mainly by scars that could be seen and touched. Why?

I believe the story of Easter would be incomplete without those scars on the hands, the feet, and the side of Jesus. When human beings fantasize, we dream of pearly straight teeth and wrinkle-free skin and sexy ideal shapes. We dream of an unnatural state: the perfect body. But for Jesus, being confined in a skeleton and human skin WAS the unnatural state. The scars are, to him, an emblem of life on our planet, a permanent reminder of those days of confinement and suffering.

I take hope in Jesus' scars. From the perspective of heaven, they represent the most horrible event that has ever happened in the history of the universe - the crucifixion - Easter turned into a memory. Because of Easter, I can hope that the tears we shed, the blows we receive, the emotional pain, the heartache over lost friends and loved ones, all these will become memories, like Jesus' scars. Scars never completely go away, but neither do they hurt any longer. We will have re-created bodies, a re-created heaven and earth. We will have a new start, an Easter start.

YORK CHESTER MIDDLE SCHOOL MENTORING PROGRAM

Gaston County School System mentoring program began in 1994 and has had many success stories over the years. York Chester has voiced gratitude over the years for all that the disciples of Holy Trinity have done for the school and its students. In addition to the tangible needs, they have voiced a need for mentors.

What does a mentor do? A mentor is someone who has good listening skills and is willing to invest 40 minutes a week with a student. Activities can include sharing time together, reading a book together, doing a fun activity together, talking, and building a relationship with the student. The time spent is not focused on academia, yet the result of having a positive and encouraging relationship with the student has a direct impact on the student's success in the classroom, graduation, secondary education, and life in general. You make a difference. How wonderful is that?

What is involved in making a mentoring commitment? The program asks that a mentor commit to one year of mentoring with a student. This typically is a weekly visit of 40 minutes and takes place during the school day on the school grounds. Applications can be made online <u>gastonschoolvolunteers.com</u>. A background check and a one-hour training and orientation class are required.

WHAT WE LEARNED FROM THE HUMAN TRAFFICKING SEMINAR

In February, Holy Trinity hosted a Human Trafficking awareness seminar led by Hannah Hopper of Hope United Survivor Network. We learned some eye-opening truths about what labor and sexual trafficking looks like, how it happens, and how to report it.

- Most victims are trafficked by someone they know, not strangers in windowless vans.
 - Traffickers are often an addicted family member who needs drugs or money for drugs.
 - Traffickers groom their victims for a long period of time over an internet relationship to earn trust. The victim is coaxed into meeting the trafficker in person.
 - Adults are forced into labor to pay off a debt or by being brought into this country under false pretenses.
 - Elderly, healthy adults are often controlled by family for their house and money.
 - Elderly adults can be abused or trafficked by nursing home personnel.
- Victims can't just speak up, run away, or call the police.
 - Traffickers maintain the victims silence and cooperation by threatening their lives and the lives of their families.
 - Victims of labor trafficking may be from another country and not speak or understand English.
 - Traffickers might be blackmailing the victims.
 - o Traffickers are patient and will gaslight/brainwash their potential victims for years.
 - Victims raised by their traffickers have been in that situation their entire lives and are sheltered from knowing what a healthy family is.
 - Homeless population is vulnerable because no one notices if they disappear.
- North Carolina is ninth in the nation for highest level of human trafficking.
 - Charlotte is number one in the state.
 - There are two international airports.
 - Interstate system gives easy access to Atlanta, New York City, and Florida
 - Yes, it happens in our County and close to our Church.

There are clues to help spot a victim of trafficking.

- Despite being able-bodied and of sound mind, they are being controlled by a person.
 - They have no access to their own identification documents.
 - They can't go anywhere on their own. Driving privileges taken away.
 - They don't control their own money.
 - o They can't make any decisions on their own.
- They exhibit signs of physical assault.
- They frequently have sexually transmitted infections.
- They have repeated hotel stays.

THE VOICE OF THE MARTYRS

Founders: Richard and Sabina Wurmbrand (A short introduction for the family of Holy Trinity)

In order to understand the ministry of the Voice of Martyrs, it is important and helpful to know about the man that began the ministry. The man was Richard Wurmbrand who was born in Bucharest, Romania in 1909. He was a Jew. In his

early life he became an atheist. Through the Christian witness of a Messianic Jewish pastor Isaac Feinstein, Wurmbrand accepted Christ as his personal Savior and became a Christian. He later became a Lutheran pastor and ministered to the Jewish people in Romania, mostly through the underground church for 25 years. Jews were disliked and persecuted in Romania. When World War 2 ended, the Russians came into Romania with their band of hate for the Jews. Pastor Wurmbrand found himself in prison. He was imprisoned for 14 years; three of those years were in solitary confinement, thirty feet underground where it was dark, damp, and cold. There were no windows. The food was scarce too. He was also brutally tortured and beaten on a regular basis. He had the scars to prove it. He was freed after 14 years of confinement when the Norwegian Lutheran Church was able to raise enough money to pay his ransom. His message and witness to groups and congregations after his release from prison were always the same. He spoke about LOVE and FORGIVENESS!

These four passages of scripture really define the man. (1) Romans 1:16 "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Jesus Christ for it is the power of God unto Salvation for everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek." (2) Luke 9:23 Jesus says, "If any man should follow me let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me." (3) Paul writes in Galatians 2:20, "I have been crucified with Christ; it is not I that live, but Christ who lives in me." (4) Romans 12:2a Paul writes, "Do not conform to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind."

Pastor Wurmbrand and his wife, Sabina, came to the United States in 1967 and settled in Bartlesville, Oklahoma; he then began the Voice of the Martyrs Ministry.

VOM ministry is a nonprofit, interdenominational organization dedicated to assisting the persecuted church worldwide. The VOM has many ministries. To name two: it seeks to raise awareness about the many thousands of Christians annually who are tortured, imprisoned or harassed for their beliefs, and to encourage and empower Christians to fulfill the Great Commission in areas of the world where they are persecuted. This is accomplished by providing Bibles, literature, radio broadcasts and other forms of aid and giving relief to the families of Christians martyrs in these areas of the world. VOM ministry is funded through donations of supporting churches and individuals. The address for the VOM ministry in the United States is P.O. Box 443, Bartlesville, Oklahoma.

¹⁶ Three times a year all your men must appear before the Lord your God at the place he will choose: at the Festival of Unleavened Bread, the Festival of Weeks and the Festival of Tabernacles. No one should appear before the Lord empty-handed: ¹⁷ Each of you must bring a gift in proportion to the way the Lord your God has blessed you. (Deuteronomy 16: 16-17 NIV)

We see in this verse, three times a year every male was to make a journey to the sanctuary in the city, that would be designated as Israel's religious capital.
