





My Dear Fellow Travelers,

Corrie ten Boom once said: *Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God.* In the light of that statement, read the following history of this amazing Christian woman. For her efforts to hide Jews from arrest and deportation during the German occupation of the Netherlands, Corrie ten Boom (1892-1983) received recognition from the Yad Vashem Remembrance Authority as one of the "Righteous Among the Nations" on December 12, 1967. In resisting Nazi persecution, ten Boom acted in concert with her Christian beliefs, her family experience, and the Dutch resistance. Her defiance led to imprison-

ment, internment in a concentration camp, and loss of family members who died from maltreatment while in German custody.

None of us can relate to our family and friends dying in concentration camps. But we have all had journeys that have taken us through rough times as well as times of great meaning and joy. For us Christians, Corrie's advice could never have been so timely: *Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God*.

I wrote the first half of my article on Wednesday, March 20. I am completing this article the afternoon of Palm Sunday, March 24. We not only began Holy Week, we also called Rev. Ryan Henkel to be our new Lead Pastor. Now, we wait. Pastor Henkel has 2 weeks to accept or reject the call. The great majority of the church is praying he will answer in the affirmative! Corrie ten Boom's advice is so very relevant. *Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God*.

As I conclude my last Herald article I do so with a grateful heart and hopeful spirit. My last Sunday with you will be April 28. I am so very grateful for your love and support. Anne and I have felt this from the first day I started our interim time with you. We now look forward to my retirement period. We pray for continued good health as we enter this new phase of our lives.

My prayer is that the Lord will bless Holy Trinity with vision, ministry focus and a deep desire to serve Jesus in and through our church. Please allow St. Paul's words to become my words of encouragement as you face a new future. Philippians 1:6 (ESV) And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.

The Lord bless you and keep you, the Lord make his face to shine upon you and give you peace. **Pastor Tom**

PS - On April 21, I will be preaching at the 100th Anniversary of our home congregation, Holy Trinity Lutheran in Troutman, NC. Cody Carpenter will be preaching in my stead.

A WORD OF ENCOURAGEMENT

I invite your continued prayers for those who are asking questions about the faith, for the baptized who are growing in the faith, and for our parish to remain a faithful signpost, pointing people to the Kingdom of God.

APRIL IS CAM MONTH AT HOLY TRINITY

Holy Trinity Disciples,

April is our Crisis Assistance Ministry supply month focused mostly on collecting food for distribution at their facility in Gastonia. Holy Trinity has always delivered generously to this collection effort. Most of you are probably aware of their service, but for those who are not, this is their Mission Statement:

Crisis Assistance Ministry is a cooperative ministry of the greater Gastonia faith community. By providing direct emergency assistance through collaboration with other community resources, CAM assists those facing financial crisis or struggling with the burden of poverty. Established in 1976, CAM provides emergency assistance with food, necessary utilities, and rent/mortgage to low-income households in the greater Gastonia community. CAM serves about one-half of Gaston County, including those residing inside Gastonia city limits and rural areas surrounding the city limits. At this time, CAM does not provide assistance to residents in other cities/towns in Gaston County.

Holy Trinity will be collecting **pre-packaged**, "shelf stable" food, and hygiene products that we will deliver to their facility to be distributed in the community throughout the month of April. They will certainly, happily accept any donations, but we are including a list of some "much needed items" that they have requested.

YORK CHESTER MIDDLE SCHOOL MENTORING PROGRAM

This article appeared in March's Herald, but is running again in case anyone has not had an opportunity to read and consider.

Gaston County School System's mentoring program began in 1994 and has had many success stories over the years. York Chester has voiced gratitude many times over for all the disciples of Holy Trinity have done and continue to do for the school and its students. In addition to the tangible needs they have voiced a need for mentors.

What does a mentor do? A mentor is someone who has good listening skills and is willing to invest 40 minutes a week with a student. Sharing time together, reading a book together, doing a fun activity together, talking, and building a relationship with the student. The time spent is not focused on academia, yet the result of having a positive and encouraging relationship with the student has a direct impact on students' success in the classroom, graduation, secondary education, and life in general. You make a difference. How wonderful is that?

What is involved in making a mentoring commitment? The program asks that a mentor commit to one year of mentoring with a student. This typically is a weekly visit of 40 minutes and takes place during the school day on the school grounds. Applications can be made online <u>gastonschoolvolunteers.com</u>. A background check and a one-hour training and orientation class are required.



ENDOWMENT HIGHLIGHT

Home of Hope - Estonia

The Republic of Estonia is a Baltic Sea nation whose history is rich in beautiful culture and Christendom. The Protestant Reformation had a major impact on the country and prior to WWII, 80% of her citizens were Protestant/Lutherans. That all changed with the Soviet occupation and oppression from 1940-1991.

Anti-Christian legislation during this time saw church property confiscated, work with children and youth, and the publication of Christian material banned. The Church lost two thirds of its clergy; some killed, many exiled to Siberia along with the deportation of thousands more Estonians, and 100,000 fleeing during WW2. The country, which is about the size of West Virginia, was reduced not just in numbers but in its belief in Christ. A country whose anchor and compass were once found in Christ was now adrift.

Today, the 2021 National Census shows Christian affiliation of *any kind* is only 26% of the population. Lutherans make up 11% of that number. **Home of Hope - Tartu Academy** is working to change these statistics and reclaim both their country and beyond its borders for Jesus Christ. Home of Hope ministries in Tartu, Estonia includes a Bible School, Christian Radio which reaches Estonia, Eastern Europe, and portions of Russia, and many other Christ focused, Christ driven missions.

The Endowment Fund approved a 2024 grant to partner with Home of Hope in proclaiming the Gospel of Christ and bringing the Good News once again to its people. We pray for God's continued provision for the ministry work there.

When is it a Tithe?

on's official title at our church was usher, but his mission was to never hand out a bulletin, never pass the plate, and never ring the bell. Not that he was bad at those thinas. He just preferred that someone else do them. Don rejoiced to watch eight-year-old Garrett greet people with bulletins, when his granddaughter collected the offering, and when ten-year-old Liliana yanked on the rope to ring the church bell. He taught each child old enough to show even an ounce of interest how to go about the tasks with care, faithfulness, and joy.

Don wasn't merely keeping the children busy. He was stewarding their hearts. The children were not observers; the day they belonged was now. Don was catechizing and ushering in the next generation of those willing to faithfully serve.

This very thing is the call given in Deuteronomy 11. God calls his people into a covenant of sacrificial love and obedience. He revealed to Israel who he is and delivered his people from slavery, showing he is a God who honors his promises and does not forget his people. In return, we are to love the Lord our God with all our heart, all our soul, and all

our might. Central in this passage is the message to teach our children to do likewise. We love the God we serve, we rejoice, and we invite the youngest and smallest among us to love, learn, serve, and rejoice.

It's tempting to cast stewardship as an adult topic, but it is part of worship — part of remembering with all our senses who God is and what he has done. Children who help set the altar for Holy Communion begin to understand that they, too, are gathered to God's table. Children whose voices join the choir not just sometimes but throughout the year begin to understand that they, too, are among the saints who gather around the throne of Christ. Children who welcome friends and strangers at the doors of the church begin to understand the ways baptism equips them for the Great Commission. Children who have the opportunity to give an offering at Sunday School begin to feel God's own aenerosity and understand what it means to return that to him. Those moments of liturgy and catechesis shape who we are and how we understand God's generosity.

By Don's own admission, it took

fifty years for him to realize the joy of giving to the church. He did give money — more than ten percent! — but it wasn't a tithe: "It might as well have been a membership fee. It hadn't hit my heart yet." Don's tithing began when he began to recognize the lessons he wrote upon the hearts of the next generation. He eventually realized that the same God who freed Israel from slavery and each of us from the bondage of sin and death was freeing him to imperfectly and enthusiastically give everything he had. His giving became not about a percentage, but about the **Lord our God,** who brought us into the promised land of grace and forgiveness and invites us to receive and give the joy of participating in the justice, mercy, and faithfulness of our Lord. When that hits your heart. no matter how old you are, that's when you begin to tithe.

We teach each other to tithe at home and away, in the morning and in the evening, in the rituals and in the life of the church. In this, our God writes his promise upon our hearts and the hearts of our children—a promise that his generosity endures from age to age.
